Planned Enlargement of Frieth School

From the Head Teacher, Martin Gosling

Firstly, thank you for your time in reading this communication from Frieth CEC School regarding a subject which I know resonates strongly throughout the local community. For those who aren't aware, we plan to admit approximately 10 more children per year, for the next 5 years. I can assure you that this decision wasn't taken lightly and followed several strategy meetings with the Governing Body which focused on securing the long-term future of the school. Schools are funded by an allocation of money per pupil and, speaking candidly, without these increased numbers the school would not be financially viable and at significant risk of closure. I fully understand your concerns and frustrations with traffic and parking, and of course, the school has considered the local infrastructure, with this increase in size. We have already taken several measures which include:

- 1. An agreement with The Yew Tree public house to use the car park and for the children to walk the remainder of their journey into school.
- 2. The implementation of a car-sharing app 'Home Run'.
- 3. Increased investment in our wrap-around care, including staggered pick-up options.
- 4. Before-school clubs: From September, there will be a before-school clubs from Wednesday Friday.
- 5. Additional parking on Parmoor Park Farm and the avenue of trees next to the cricket club.
- 6. From September, we will be moving to staggered entry, e.g. by age group.

Recently, some of the Governing Body members and I had a constructive meeting with representatives from the local community who shared their concerns, and I am keen for the school and the residents to continue to build a positive relationship.

Frieth Village Society (FVS) Response, From David House, Chairman

On 1st July, Amanda Hopkins (Local Parish Councillor) and I attended a meeting with the Head Teacher and the Chair and School Governors representatives to discuss the current traffic issues, the planned developments of the school and their impact on the village/community. In addition to the immediate increase in traffic through the village, there is also the potential future build of additional classroom(s) to consider. During the discussion, we represented views from the village, in particular from the FVS AGM discussion. We agreed that a thriving school is important to Frieth, but achieving this must be balanced with the wider community's needs. We concluded that:

- **Pupil numbers** in 2022/23 were 119 and in 20024/25 are proposed to be 155, the proposed additional 10-15 p.a. will be capped at 196.

-The Car sharing app is a positive idea although take up/adoption is known to be low.

-**Staggered entry times** to try to spread out the traffic and avoid the current 'gridlock' situations: An increase in pupil numbers potentially negates this measure since more traffic is coming into the village overall. Plus, since related pressures on parents include their work times, unavoidably running late, etc. many are less likely to adhere to them.

-Farm parking: Offering parking at the top end of the village means most cars still drive through the village (past the school), which seems less helpful. In bad weather, we doubt parents will choose this option.

-School bus: Of all the measures discussed, we believe the provision of a school bus would be most helpful for the situation. Cost is of course a major concern for the school, but parents who choose Frieth CEC School from neighbouring areas should be prepared to support such an initiative and FVS also offered to help.

-More engagement/consultation with the village is vital to find solutions that work for all stakeholders.

We suggested Martin use our Newsletter to engage the village and we're pleased to include his first article here.
